Week 6 of the 2021 Legislative session proved to be another busy one. Dozens of subcommittees were held each day with many of them moving through full committee as well. The first funnel deadline is in two weeks so we should start to see a slowdown of bills being drafted moving forward. Also, last Friday was the final day for lawmakers to request their own bills, meaning the final round of individually sponsored legislation is over. From now on only leadership and committee chairs will be permitted to introduce new legislation this session.

As the first funnel deadline approaches, we see legislation gaining or losing momentum. Vote counts are done in the majority caucuses determining which bills move forward or die from lack of support. Nearly all our monitored and supported bills have already made it out of full committee putting us in a great position moving into funnel week. The few bills that we have registered against are still live rounds and we will continue to work against them up until the funnel deadline.

The 411 bill did not make it to the House floor for debate this week but that shouldn't be a cause for concern. Rep Kauffman continues to work with his Senate colleagues to iron out issues and concerns. We are hopeful these issues can get worked out prior to the House passing it to the Senate for consideration. We also continue to work with Representative Klein on the House version of Back the Blue. We are seeing progress and are hopeful to have this language drafted soon.

Redaction Fee: Raises the fee for recording transactions in a county by \$1 and scoops the money for redactions of information about police, judges and prosecutors in documents. Peer Counseling: Includes the communications between civilian employees of a law enforcement agency or fire department and a peer counselor in the confidentiality protections for communications with those counselors. Lasers: Defines pointing a laser at someone with the intent to cause or injure the person an assault. Makes exceptions for law enforcement, medical personnel and laser tag. Crimes: Makes bias-motivated harassment of a law enforcement officer, prison or jail employer, fire fighters, and similar employees a Class D or Class C felony, depending on damages and injuries. Creates 2nd degree criminal mischief and makes it a Class D felony. Makes rioting a Class D felony. Makes unlawful assembly an aggravated misdemeanor. Establishes disorderly conduct offenses ranging from a serious misdemeanor to a Class C felony for blocking roads, streets or sidewalks, depending on circumstances, damages and injuries. Requires a person arrested for criminal mischief to be held for at least 24 hours. Requires the court to make written findings that the defendant is not likely to resume the criminal behavior causing the arrest if released. (Governor)
